August 2022 — This summer welcomed the grand opening of what might be considered one of the most exciting exhibits in Susan B. Anthony Birthplace history.

The Susan B. Anthony Birthplace Museum was proud to present the launch of Autographs and Timeless Wisdom on August 4th in honor of the month that commemorates the passage of the 19th amendment, the Susan B. Anthony Amendment.

The exhibit, being held for viewing now through Thanksgiving, features a recently donated Gilded Age-era autograph book

holding Susan B. Anthony's hand-written quote and signature. It is considered to be the only one in existence.

The quote is undocumented in any of Anthony's archived speeches or correspondence according to extensive research done by summer intern, Meredith Kottom. Furthermore, Susan's sentiment appears to be written in response to a message written on the prior page.

Dated July 11, 1900, in Rochester, New York, Ms. Anthony's entry reads,

"Whether possessed of the characteristics of the oak, the vine or the flower all truly developed human beings love liberty and demand for themselves and their fellows the possession of equality of rights, privileges and immunities irrespective of sex or any mere accident of birth!"

Susan B. Anthony

Four years earlier, on January 29, 1886, famous politician and orator, Robert Ingersollsigned the autograph book just before Anthony's entry, writing

"Men are oaks, women are vines, children are flowers."

Ingersoll's message is not a secret to public ears. It appeared in his earlier work, "The Liberty of Children."

EARLIEST FEMINIST MARY WOLSTONECRAFT MEETS Young S.B.A. Descendent

The Susan B Anthony Birthplace's 2022 annual birthday celebration would have had our favorite feminist foremother glued to her screen watching keynote speaker, Erika Bachiochi, give an illuminating presentation about 18th century woman's rights advocate, Mary Wollstonecraft.

This year, the Museum hosted legal scholar and author of "The Rights of Women," Erika Bachiochi, to speak on Wollstonecraft's influence on American 19th century suffragists.

Mary Wollstonecraft was the earliest international woman's rights advocate. Her book published in Great Britain in 1792, "A Vindication of the Rights of Woman," particularly influenced SBA's colleague, Elizabeth Cady Stanton. Bachiochi connected suffrage over two centuries and two continents. The lecture can be watched on You-Tube by visiting the Birthplace's channel: The Susan B. Anthony Birthplace Museum.


Bachiochi specializes in Equal Protection, jurisprudence, feminist legal theory, Catholic social teaching, and sexual ethics. She is also a 2018-19 visiting scholar at Harvard Law School and currently a Senior Fellow at the Abigail Adams

Institute in Cambridge, MA where she directs the Wollstonecraft Project. Her latest book "The Rights of Women: Reclaiming a Lost Vision" examines the earliest roots of suffrage, beginning in Great Britain. Her new publication can be purchased at several places including Amazon and Barnes and Noble.

The event was not entirely academic-focused, though. Susan's birthday always calls for more than one exciting feature. The annual birthday bash also premiered a video production produced by young activists, Faith and Hope Motta, who tell a short, fictional story about the lives

Ruby, who lived in the attic and worked at the Anthony Family mill when Susan was a child. To their surprise, Faith and Hope Motta discovered their ancestry to Susan B. Anthony during the course of their research.

"OPurse of Her Own" A POLITICAL ECONOMY PERSPECTIVE: SUSAN B. ANTHONY'S SUFFRAGE ACTIVISM

An Excerpt, Internship paper by Meredith Kottom

"The 1848 Seneca Falls Convention is perhaps one of the most-well known events in the early movement for women's equal rights in the United States. Organized by Elizabeth Cady Stanton, over 300 people signed the Declaration of Sentiments and Resolutions at the New York convention, echoing the American Declaration of Independence's list of grievances. Among such sentiments included woman's inability to own property and her disenfranchisement, "thereby leaving her without representation in the halls of legislation" and oppressed "on all sides." Among these sides of repression included that of the economic sphere, which renowned suffrage movement leader Susan B. Anthony clearly understood and sought to change in her arguments and activism for women's financial independence.

"A look into Susan's upbringing, early teaching career, and family's economic struggles provides a foundation for understanding her economic and labor-related arguments for women's enfranchisement. Through her newspaper The Revolution, diary entries, and speeches, Susan argued women could obtain pecuniary independence and support themselves. She tied her belief in women's equal property rights and wages to the suffrage question, arguing woman's representation in the legislature could change her economic situation and consequently social station of dependence and silence."

Meredith's report continues to explore the political economy-related events in Susan's life, beginning with the influences of her Quaker upbringing, female workers in her father's textile mill in Adams, and the work and injustices she experienced in her teaching career. She also explains the impact of the major American recession during the Panic of 1837 on Susan's family and their understanding of economic independence, and analyzes Susan's roles in reform movement fundraising and petitioning work. Through an exploration of The Revolution articles offering economic advice and vocational opportunities for women, Meredith connects Susan's mission to advance economic freedom as necessary for women's full independence and citizenship. The essay continues to explore Anthony's later speeches and activism as they relate to political economy.

In an interview with the Berkshire Eagle published on August 18, 2022, Museum Board Member & Director of Marketing Carrie Miller said upon discovery of this connection,

"At first, it was considered to be another powerful quote from Anthony, but when we realized her message appeared to be an extension of Ingersoll's, it was as if we had gotten into the mind of Anthony at the time she read his quote and put her take on it. It was a momentous moment to experience something that had only been in the hands of a couple previous owners."

Massachusetts residents Terry Maitland and Gail Clock donated the treasured item that belonged to their family for so long. The original owner of the book, Emma Herne, was an

actress during the 19th century, who would take in-person autographs or have her book sent to the prominent persons for their signatures. The book was passed down for three generations where

it acquired additional signatures in similar

The exhibit highlights the entries of two other

well-known suffragists, Harriet Beecher Stowe, author of Uncle Tom's Cabin, and Julia Ward Howe, credited with founding Mother's Day. Nine Presidents including Theodore Roosevelt, Woodrow Wilson, and Calvin Coolidge signed the book as well.

The 5"x 9" leather-bound volume also holds the signatures and sentiments of several American social reformers, scientists, and writers such as Booker T. Washington, Mark Twain, Alexander Graham Bell, Thomas Edison, and Hellen Keller.

Nearly all of the messages left in the book can be found in other publications cited with the author, but seemingly not Anthony's. Her message appears to be unique to this book, and as it mentions birth, perhaps it was meant to stay at the place of her birth.

All pages of the book have been digitized and are available to flip through on the Museum kiosk.

Also included in the exhibit room is an engaging activity for kids. Children are

welcome to practice their own



signatures with a special calligraphy pen and traditional autograph book.

Susan B Anthony's Birthplace Director, Cassie Peltier, Featured in Documentary




Western New York is home to several influential activists that altered American history: Frederick Douglass, Julia Wilbur, and of course, our own Susan B. Anthony. Rochester, New York , the film suggests, strategically — or perhaps divinely \cdot orchestrated as the film suggests, the beginnings of critical social movements between the 17th and 19th centuries. The four-year-in-the-making documentary released this year explores the historical timeline of those who influenced both the civil and religious landscape.

Producer and Founder of Lifetree Media and Movement, Garret Wendt, visited the Birthplace Museum in 2018 and interviewed Museum Director Cassie Peltier. Wendt also interviewed President of the Birthplace Museum Board and Rochester native Carol Crossed, who spoke about Anthony's activist life and roots.

"I am Rochester: The Journey to Restored Identity," premiered in Rochester on April 24, 2022. Members of the Board of Directors in attendance included Eric Anthony, an Anthony family descendant, who received a standing ovation from the sold-uut

A COMMUNITY EFFORT

In the fall of 2021, a bright and enthusiastic high school youth reached out to the Museum and asked if she could volunteer. Her resume was colorful and extensive. We knew Susan B. immediately made a friend and surprisingly discovered a relative.

Faith Motta, passionate about theatre and writing, hoped to focus on volunteering towards a project related to her interests. When a SBABM board member mentioned the idea of recreating the lives of the Mill girls who lived in the attic of the Anthony Homestead when Susan was a child, Faith was enthused by the idea. Being well read and from a mill town herself, Faith already knew about mill children from Joseph Manning's book, "Child Labor at the Eclipse Mill." The project was a match made in heaven!

Enter mill girl sisters Margaret and Ruby, aka Faith and Hope, who are real sisters in life too. Along with the help of parents Donna and David Motta and the SBABM staff, an extensive amount of time was spent during the winter months creating a short video production about living in the attic at 67 East Road in the early 19th century.

Faith wholeheartedly took on the research and writing of the script, the study of mill girls' fashion, and thought of various locations for filming. Together with museum docent and camera man, Marty Loughman, Faith and Hope spent over 20 hours filming and editing. The film was aired for the first time at the Susan B. 1. Why were you interested in volunteering?

I was looking for a way to get involved in the community! I love history. I looked online for local volunteer opportunities, and found the Birthplace. I had been on a tour of the Birthplace a few years earlier and was a great opportunity!

2. What did you love most about the experience of producing and starring as Margaret?

When filming, I truly felt like was a Mill Girl. It was so special. My family got to participate, both as actors as well as script writers. I really enjoyed working with my family and the Birthplace staff. The days we were shooting were snowy and Berkshire-esque. It felt like I was a character in a book!

The most incredible part of our research was discovering our familial relation to Susan! Learning my family is related to the Anthony's made the project even more special.

3. How did you find working with the museum staff?

The staff at the Birthplace are wonderful! They were always so open to ideas and questions. The staff helped me get costumes, complete the script, and get the word out so the Mill Girls.

4. What would you to say to someone your age who may be interested in volunteering for the Birthplace?

The Birthplace is a really great opportunity. Whatever your passion is, the Birthplace will find a place for you! It is such a great way to learn about communication, community, and history!

The Susan B. Anthony Birthplace Museum, Inc. is a not-for-profit corporation, dedicated to preserving the birthplace and raising public awareness of the wide-ranging legacy of the great social reformer, Susan B. Anthony, who was a pioneering feminist and suffragist as well as a noteworthy figure in the abolitionist, Restellism (opposition to abortion), and temperance movements of the 19th century.

As part of its mission, the Museum highlights the familial and regional influences which shaped Miss Anthony's early life, by displaying the textiles and furnishings of that period, as well as the literature and other memorabilia associated with her later career.

Former director for the Birthplace Cassandra Peltier sewed this dress as an intern for the museum in 2016. After its completion, it was exhibited at the Seneca Falls Heritage & Tourism Center in NY for the 2020 Suffrage Centennial. It is now exhibited at The Susan B. Anthony Birthplace Museum where it finds its forever home.

The rural, Federal-style home is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. It contains a portrait gallery, legacy room, and the room where Anthony was born depicting family and Quaker life in the early 1800s. It showcases authentic period pieces, ephemera, and a detailed timeline.

Meredith describes her experience in her own words:

"My first trip to the east coast, interning at the Susan B. Anthony Birthplace Museum was the summer of a lifetime. I had the opportunity to experience a new, scenic part of the country in the Berkshire mountains where I got to know the community. I also got to live where a woman I aspire to be like was born and grew up, in addition to working with passionate female employees and museum board members.

"Being able to curate an exhibit about a precious artifact signed by Susan featuring her eloquent rhetoric, researching her life while living in her home, and sharing her story and beliefs regarding human liberty and women's rights with the public was truly special.

"One of my favorite quotes from Susan as recorded in her biography is: 'I have made up my mind that we can expect only a certain amount of comfort wherever we may be, and that it is the disposition of the person, more than the surroundings, that creates happiness.' As Susan's exciting and challenging career filled with suffrage campaigns, petitions to Congress, lecture circuits, reform activism, nation-wide travel, and endless

correspondence began to unfold through my research and time at the museum, I saw this notion of determination and optimism ring true throughout her life. Her disposition and courage to do what was right allowed her to advance justice in American society.

I hope to live like Susan in this aspect, and I am very grateful for my summer internship in the rural town of Adams. The Museum and people there will always have a special place in my heart."

HARRIET TUBMAN MUSEUM DIRECTOR To Celebrate Susan's 203rd Birthplace Birthday

The Susan B. Anthony birthday celebration is the highlight of the year for the Birthplace Museum. There are so many facets of Susan's life to celebrate, and each year the Museum celebrates a significant part of her work



FEBRUARY

One of those significant elements of Anthony's life was her public and active abolition work. She assembled anti-slavery signatures and even held an assembly in support of the passing of the 13th ammendment. Anthony also assisted Harriet Tubman in her work with the Underground Railroad.

That is why, in 2023, 3 years after the opening of the Harriet Tubman Museum of South Jersey in Cape May, New Jersey, the birthplace will host Executive Director, Cynthia Mullock, as the keynote for Anthony's 203rd birthday. Birthplace Museum President Carol Crossed is a founding member of the Harriet Tubman Museum and has known Mullock for some time.

Mullock has an interesting background and diverse skill set. Her family is immersed in the cultural and political life of Cape May New Jersey, one of four Landmark Cities in the United States. She spent 15 years in corporate legal services and investing. Today, she passionately serves non-profit organizations and founded the Harriet Tubman Museum and the restoration of an old bed and breakfast: 5 Perry Street in Cape May. Mullock will discuss her interest in restoring the home, as well as the connection between Harriet Tubman and Susan B. Anthony.

The Harriet Tubman Museum of South Jersey is recognized by Smithsonian Magazine as one of the top 10 anticipated museums in the world in 2020 and by USA TODAY Readers' Choice Awards as the #5 Best New Museum in the U.S. for 2021.

While the past few birthday celebrations have been held virtually, next year's will be held at the Adams Free Memorial Library in Adams, MA near the Birthplace Museum on February 12, 2023.

The Starlight Girls loved their experience. Many of them crowded around the Museum kiosk scrolling through


various signatures in the autograph book exhibit. Others stuck their heads in the Museum's wooden farmer face cut outs and shopped at the gift shop.
